Environmental charities should be in charge of their own spending parameters for the following reasons:

- 1. The community expects environmental groups to be strong advocates for environmental outcomes.

- 5. Some major environmental problems, like climate change, can't be stopped just through on-ground environmental remediation. Consider the present plight of The Great Barrier Reef.
- 6. The Inquiry and discussion paper create a false dichotomy between remediation and advocacy. On-ground work often needs supporting policies or funding from government, which may only arise as a result of advocacy. We the people of Australia have already taken from this land and its seas in ways which have left it less stable and less biodiverse. Species are being killed off. The country is becoming ever more drought prone. If we go not have the environmental charity groups looking out for the needs of the country from an environmental perpective, we are doomed to perpetuate the sins of the past.
